In any case, I thought what I'd do was, show that BBSes are still around and are still fun places to be!



They could still do things like print, program, and do accounting and games, but most used tapes as their method of program loading, because otherwise you were presented with a screen that booted up into BASIC and that was it.

BASIC on most of the computers was very powerful, however, and the great things about computers of that era was that there was no layers between user and computer interaction. What you typed was what happened! This BBS is a reminder of that era. Everything is slow-going, but it has tons of interesting details for you to check out. This is the help screen.

## What is a BBS?

 A BBS is a Bulletin Board System, usually hosted on an individual's server, sometimes in their home or on a Virtual Private Server. They were huge in the 80's and 90's before the advent of the world wide web. The main benefit back then was that it was easy to find a local community, files, email and other things just by dialing in to one.
